1. To elect a Vice-Chair for the Committee:

RESOLVED: CIIr K Holladay was elected Vice-Chair of the Committee, as proposed by CIIr N Holladay, seconded by CIIr Greenbank and carried.

- 4. Public Session: no comments or questions
- 5. Minutes of the meeting held on the 25th April 2024

RESOLVED: Minutes of the meeting having been circulated were approved and signed by the Chair, as proposed by Cllr Rappé, seconded by Cllr Greenbank and carried.

Cllr K Holladay asked the Clerk about several actions from previous meetings not on the agenda so issues do not get lost, including pedestrian crossing on School Road (moving to Planning & Highways Committee), Accredited Community Safety Officer, Wickham Shell Roundabout, parking on verges, adoption of the red telephone box. The Clerk to ensure that these items are included either on GP Committee or other Committees where appropriate. ACTION: Clerk

6. Committee terms of reference

The amended terms of reference had been circulated prior to the meeting.

RESOLVED: To recommend adoption of amended Terms of Reference for the General Purposes Committee, as proposed by Cllr Phillips-Lee, seconded by Cllr Greenbank and carried.

7. Update from Clerk

The Clerk's report had been circulated prior to the meeting. Report noted.

8. Review of Parish Assembly

Cllr Phillips Lee thanked Cllr K Holladay, Cllr Chambers and Cllr Manuel for organising the catering, entertainment and awards. The one negative comment was how the timing change of the evening impacted Igloo, however the Policy & Finance Committee had already agreed to make a £100 donation for their time.

The Assembly had a much more up to date feel, especially with the background music and slides. The food provided was excellent although too much provided.

For the future Parish Assembly, any groups invited to talk should be given a time limit. Ideas for next year could be to invite grant recipients to discuss how Parish Council grants had helped their organisation; Taste of Wickham and Glebe Working Party were two such groups that could be invited to speak.

It was agreed to prepare the agenda and advertise the event much earlier in 2025.

9. Mayles Lane noticeboard

It was agreed to defer this item to the next meeting and seek different quotes for oak and only 2 berth noticeboards

10. Knowle History Boards

No update was received in time for the meeting. This item was deferred.

11. Wickham Emergency Plan

The Knowle Resident's Association are willing to share their work for the Knowle Emergency Plan. Cllrs K Holladay and Greenbank volunteered to work together on this to bring information to a future Committee meeting.

12. Community Engagement sessions and anti-social behaviour

An update on the drop-in community engagement session held on 24th May was circulated with the document pack. There will be a cyber fraud awareness sessions held in the future at Knowle Village Hall.

The incidences of anti social behaviour around Knowle are being reported by the Business Manager. ACTION: Clerk to post the WCC poster regarding reporting ALL instances of antisocial behaviour on the Facebook page.

13. Wickham Parish Magazine Article

The Clerk thanked Cllr K Holladay for her help in drafting the article for the July issue. Cllr Manuel will approve the final edit before submission to the magazine editor.

14. Relevant Correspondence/Meetings

The Clerk met with volunteers wanting to enter Wickham into Village in Bloom. South Downs Funeral are sponsoring Village in Bloom by donating admin time of their staff. Cllr N Holladay mentioned the Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan which contains a section on Wickham.

General Purposes Committee meeting – 10th October 2024

Agenda Item 5 -

To receive an update from the Clerk on matters arising

Issues relating to missing metal welcome to Wickham sign and the previously discussed Welcome to Old Knowle sign will be included on a future Planning and Highways agenda for discussion.

The hanging baskets and troughs in Wickham square were removed in early September before the Taste of Wickham event, and are being stored by Park Place Nurseries. The bedding plants opposite the Church are still in flower and have not been removed as yet.

The Tennis Club invoice and rent review will be discussed at the next Policy & Finance Committee meeting and invoice for 2024/25 will be raised once the rent review has been completed.

The Clerk has spoken to the Council's insurance company, Zurich, regarding the issue of insurance for litter picking volunteers. Zurich confirmed that as the volunteers are not working under the instruction of the Parish Council, they are not covered by the policy. The volunteers have therefore arranged their own Public Liability Insurance.

Agenda Item 6 -

To receive an update on the adoption of the red telephone box in Wickham Square

Cllr K Holladay has been leading this project and received confirmation last week from BT that they are ready to issue a contract for the Parish Council to adopt the red telephone box for £1.

The Committee will need to agree for a Parish Councillor to sign the contract, the telephone box will need to added to the Council's asset register and insurance schedule. The Council will also need to investigate options for the work needed to bring the telephone box into a better state of repair and decide its use.

The Clerk has already heard from Wickham Men's Shed that they would be willing to work with the Council to create new shelving if so desired. The Clerk has links to another Parish Council who have worked with a handyman and a Men's Shed to renovate an old red telephone box. There is a defibrillator in Station Road just a short walk up, plus another one at the Square, so it is not recommended to place another defibrillator inside the box. Ideas that have been suggested that the box could perhaps become a book & game exchange, tourist leaflet etc.

Agenda Item 7 -

To discuss Christmas 2024 plans in both Wickham and Knowle

Wickham – 16th November

The Full Council approved a grant to the Wickham Chamber of Trade for use towards the Christmas 2024 light switch on event, the balance once the Christmas tree has been purchased, light decorations placed around the Square, can be used on all of the other event costs.

The Business Manager and Cllr Sawyers have been seeking quotes for Christmas trees and this is progressing well.

The Council-owned lights, tree stands, picket fences are being collected from storage in Whiteley this week and will be stored in Wickham until the Christmas events. Storage for January 2025 will need to be discussed and arranged.

There is an appointed member from the Chamber of Trade leading the event planning, working with volunteers from Team Wickham, the Square businesses and other residents. Some event management costs are also being paid.

The Clerk in RFO capacity will pay all invoices relating to the Wickham event, and has been in contact with the Council's insurance company regarding insurance for the event.

Knowle – 8th December

The Business Manager and Cllr Sawyers have been seeking quotes for a Christmas tree in Knowle too. This will continue to progress and arrangements being made for decorating the tree will be arranged. The budget for the Knowle event is separate from the Wickham event.



VE Day 80 Bishops Frome Strawman

Ideal for Farms, Stately Homes and Country Landowners

How to Build your Strawman Beacon

This type of Beacon is ideal for farms, stately homes and our country landowners, using it a ss fun aspect to celebrate/commemorate and pay tribute to the many that gave their lives unconditionally. It could be a public event or just for family, friends and those that work so hard on the land but in a similar way during WWII to keep the Nation fed during those difficult times when many of the men of the land were out defending our country overseas, never to return.

Obtain the landowners's permission and involvement then ensure you locate your Bishops Frome Strawman at least 60m away from buildings, roads, railways and public rights of way, and a safe distance from dangerous materials and overhead power lines. Ensure it has good access for the transportation of materials for the bonfire and sufficient space for spectators to stand upwind.

Liaise with your local fire brigade and all emergency services in your area, presenting them with your plans, and seek their advice and support. In the event of dry weather, high winds and a heightened wildfire risk on the day of the event, please carefully consider scaling back initial plans where appropriate.

Prepare site by removing top layer of turt and stack away from fire area.

Use only wood and straw for combustible materials and wrap steel banding around them all to hold the bales together while burning to stop them from falling away. Please dispose of the bands responsibly after the event.

Construct a safety barrier out of ropes and stakes or scaffold poles to ensure public is kept at a safe distance from the fire.

In daylight, and for several hours, and up to lighting, check that there are no children or animals playing or hiding in or round the Strawman. Arrange for at least 12 marshals to be in attendance, and undertake a sufficient safety briefing before lighting the Strawman.

The person looking after the fire should not wear lightweight clothing that could ignite easily. They should wear a substantial outer garment of wool, or other material of low flammability, and stout boots. They should know what to do in the event of a burn injury, or a person's clothing catching fire, and should have a fire blanket ready in the Strawman area along with a number of fire extinguishers.


Lighting: the safest and recommended approach is to use paper and solid firelighters in six places just inside the walls of the Bishops Frome Strawman to ensure an even burn. Never use flammable liquids such as paraffin or petrol to get it going as this can result in uncontrolled spread of fire or explosion.








Brief history during WWII:

- ❖The Observer Corps had its roots in World War 1 when the Admiralty arranged for the police to report aircraft heard or seen within sixty miles of London.
- In August and September 1924, Major General E B Ashmore organised the first observation experiments.
- ❖The Munich crisis came during the expansion and on 26 September 1938, the Observer Corps was called out for the first time as a fully fledged organisation.





To consider quotes for a replacement noticeboard in Mayles Lane, Knowle

The noticeboard in Mayles Lane, Knowle is in a poor state of repair and is also too small for current needs. This was previously discussed by the Committee in June but deferred until the next meeting.



The current noticeboard has display of 92cm x 120cm and can fit a maximum 6 sheets A4 each side at a push. It is difficult to push pins into, has water ingress and insects living inside. The verge around it is also not being maintained.

Fitzpatrick Woolmer offer an oak A1 double door magnetic-backed noticeboard, which would fit 8 A4 sheets at £1,857 with the headerboard an extra £274. They do not offer a triple door version

To receive an update on the Shell roundabout in Wickham and decide course of action

County Councillor Stallard has looked into the possibility of the Parish Council adopting the Shell roundabout in Wickham. The answer sadly has been that adoption is not possible, however, the Council could apply for a licence to maintain it instead.

The licence costs £209.50 for 3 years. The Council has been contacted by a will/estate planning company wanting to sponsor the roundabout as they do similar in Denmead. The company have not confirmed how much they would be willing to sponsor but this could be a great way to cover some of the costs to the Parish Council.

If planting is required, the details of seeds need to be submitted as part of the licence application. It has been noted that Wickham Village in Bloom are keen to be involved in the project if the Council would like volunteers to help. Otherwise it can also be left as a Parish Council project.

Following the Full Council meeting on 26th September, where Cllr Stallard confirmed that the Parish Council are NOT able to cut the overgrown grass and weeds without this licence, Cllr Stallard has asked the Clerk to report the overgrown grass through the HCC portal. The Clerk did this on 7th October; it was noted that the roundabout appeared to have been cut at some point during the day of 7th October, but this could be a coincidence rather than due to the online report made.

Recommendation: For the Clerk to apply for a licence to maintain the Shell Roundabout and to request further information from the company wishing to sponsor the roundabout.

Wickham in Bloom does not have its own insurance and are considering joining up with Team Wickham to use their PLI policy.




